









Summary of OPEN review workshop

18th July 2024 at Wesley Memorial Church Hall, Oxford

Workshop aims: (1) Share learning with local community organisations, policymakers and universities to stimulate thinking & discussion; (2) Co-produce recommendations to inform development of the Oxfordshire Community Research Network (OCRN).

Morning session: learning and reflection

Delegates heard and watched presentations from several speakers who shared findings of the OCRN evaluation, OPEN review and CoREN evaluation (Community Research Engagement Network in North West England). This was followed by a discussion panel with the audience.

Afternoon session: co-production of recommendations for OCRN

Delegates worked in small, mixed groups to brainstorm and select up to 3 recommendations per group for OCRN. They then shared and voted on the resulting 15 recommendations via a heat mapping exercise on the wall – each participant used a red, orange and yellow sticker spot to indicate their first, second and third preference, respectively. Key findings are shown below.

The workshop included breaks for refreshments and networking, lunch provided by local community enterprise Damascus Rose Kitchen, and facilitation by OpenEdge Transforming Conflict.

Heat map: top six recommendations ranked by total number of votes (23 participants)


